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## Lockdown in force

# One dead, seven hurt in CIM riot



### Dramatic Chino rescue

A 26-year-old Montclair woman was airlifted to Loma Linda hospital in critical condition Thursday morning after she was wrapped her car around a power pole in Chino.

Rescue equipment that had been demonstrated at Chino Community Hospital's anniversary show five days earlier was put to real use to extract Indrajit Kaur from her car after the roof caved in on her when she went out of control and struck the pole on Monte Vista Ave north of Philadelphia.

Firemen used the Jaws of Life

and power cutting tools to free her. Soon after she was removed from the car in unconscious condition, a LifeFlight helicopter from Long Beach landed in the adjacent field, and within five minutes the victim was on her way to Loma Linda Hospital.

Police said that Ms. Kaur apparently lost control of her south-bound car where the street narrows from four lanes to two, hit a ditch and broadsided against the pole, crushing in the door on the driver's side and the roof. Both had to be pried off before rescue personnel could get her out.

Driver suffering from a head injury was airlifted from the scene, Monte Vista and Philadelphia, early Wednesday morning. A car driven by Indrajit Kaur of Montclair struck a utility pole. Front of car top was crushed down. Firemen used the "Jaws of Life"

A racial riot involving about 150 prisoners Wednesday night at the California Institution for Men, Chino resulted in one man dead, and seven hospitalized and an indefinite lockdown of the minimum security unit of the facility.

According to prison officials, the fights began at about 7 pm in the weight lifting area of the minimum unit where Black inmates had reserved the equipment. White inmates began using the weights and a fight resulted in a Caucasian being assaulted. He sustained serious head injuries including a skull fracture and was transferred to Riverside General Hospital where he was reported in serious but stable condition Thursday morning.

The situation escalated to involve about 150 prisoners, officials said, and a Caucasian inmate died as a result of stab wounds and a severe beating. He was pronounced dead at the CIM hospital. A Black inmate also sustained stab wounds to the neck and a punctured lung, and underwent emergency surgery at Riverside where he is listed in serious condition. He was also found to have a prison made weapon hidden in his clothing, prison officials said.

According to CIM personnel, five other inmates were hospitalized at the prison with less serious injuries and two correctional officers were injured by six to eight inmates who knocked them to the ground and kicked them. Neither were hurt enough to require hospitalization, prison personnel reported.

The minimum unit is currently on indefinite lockdown status, according to officials, and additional manpower was called in to provide double staffing on 12-hour shifts in each unit. All activities at the minimum unit have been cancelled and inmate movement is by escort only. At breakfast on Thursday, the inmates were being fed in small groups and escorted to and from the cafeteria.

The entire prison will be thoroughly searched for weapons, according to officials, and as participants in the altercation are identified they will be transferred out of the minimum unit. The prison has already identified a half dozen offenders who have been transferred to the prison central reception area.

### Judge candidates to be at forum

Both candidates for municipal court judge will be on hand for the Chamber of Commerce candidate's forum at the Community Building Monday evening at 7:30 pm.

In addition, challenger Robert Lemkau has challenged Judge Holley Graham to a debate at the Community Building the following Monday evening. Lemkau said his invitation to debate was the result of Judge Graham's letter in the Oct 11 Champion proposing that the two discuss Mr. Lemkau's criticism of the operation of the court and any other appropriate issues.

The Chamber forum, to be moderated by Loren Stone, will also feature candidates for county, state and congressional offices. Those who have indicated they would attend are assessor candidate Brian Stafford, coroner candidate Harvey Castro, assembly candidates Jim Craner and Chuck Bader, state senate candidate Dean Kurtz, and congressional candidate Bob Erwin. Congressman Jerry Lewis' office said he had a conflict and might not attend.

Senator Ruben Ayala has been dodging a public confrontation with his opponent on the grounds that he doesn't want to give Mr. Kurtz publicity. He will probably not be present, his staff indicated. Assessor R Gordon Young and Coroner candidate Brian McCormick had not given the Chamber a definite answer by Wednesday.

### Gunshot victim condition critical

A two-year-old girl accidentally shot Tuesday was reported in critical but stable condition in the Chino Community Hospital intensive care unit. Christina Ancira of 12406 Fern Ave suffered a .38 caliber bullet wound in the forehead. The bullet exited in front of the ear, according to police.

Officers were called to the hospital emergency room, where the girl had been taken by a private car. They were told by the girl's mother, through an interpreter, that the girl's five-year-old sister had said the smaller child was injured when a radio exploded.

Back at the residence officers did not find the .38 pistol where it was usually kept. Finally the gun was found hidden in a cardboard box in a closet. The older girl became frightened and hid the gun, according to Captain Jerry Stephens.

## Murder trial resumes here

Trial of Roy Summers, 41, of the 1977 murder of his former wife in San Bernardino, was scheduled to resume yesterday after a recess that began last week after the defendant suffered a seizure.

The superior court trial has been underway in the Chino court building for 17 weeks.

Summers was taken to Chino Community Hospital, Oct 5, after he and he was suffering some chest and abdominal pains. He was later transferred to the San Bernardino County Medical Center.

Summers is accused of murdering his ex-wife,

who had remarried, and kidnapping her two children, one of whom is his. They have never been located.

In a recent development, Judge William Pitt Hyde allowed a research psychologist to testify on how memory works, over the objections of prosecutor Michael Smith. Kathy Pzadek, who teaches at the Claremont Graduate School, was called to the stand by defense attorney, Timothy Guhin, who has maintained that investigators had influenced prosecution witnesses.

Another interruption occurred when a juror was injured in an automobile mishap and was unable to attend court the day before Summers' medical problem.

Chino Municipal Court has but one judge and two courtrooms, which is the reason that the lengthy trial was moved here from San Bernardino, freeing a courtroom there. The move also provided a limited experiment of a superior court judge helping out the municipal court during times of overloading.

### Manager candidates being interviewed

A committee composed of a community member, the city's consultant on personnel and two city managers is interviewing five candidates for the position of Chino city manager today.

Some or all of the semi-finalists will be interviewed by the City Council tomorrow, starting at 8:30 am. The committee and council members will meet for discussion tonight at 8 pm.

Serving on the committee interviewing the candidates today are Al McCombs, editor and publisher of Champion Publications, representing the community and Bill Hamilton, personnel consultant, and two city managers, whom Mr. Hamilton was reluctant to name without having their permission to do so.

Mayor Larry Walker said that the council members would decide tonight how many of the candidates would be interviewed tomorrow.

Former City Manager John Gerard, who is now in private development, left the manager's position Sept 1. Personnel Manager Jim Hart has been acting in that position pending appointment of a new manager. Bob Fiat, now West Covina manager, was first to hold the position in Chino.

Announcement of the new manager may come at the Nov 2 council meeting, next regular session.

### Ayala Park dedication

Dedication ceremonies for the new Ruben S Ayala Community Park are set for 10 am next Saturday, Oct 23, but the park, with its multiple fields will be in use all day beginning at 7:30 am.

The dedication will include a presentation by the Marine Corp and the pledge to the flag led by Chino Lionel (Bush) Madole, Dept Chief of Staff for the Disabled American Veterans. Chino High School band will provide the music for the national anthem followed by invocation by Pastor John Moore of the Church of the Nazarene.

Opening remarks and introduction of distinguished guests will be made by Loren Stone, local civic leader, and Mayor Larry Walker will welcome guests. Carolyn Owens chairperson of the Parks and Recreation Commission will speak about

the volunteer efforts in the parks system. Also taking the podium will be Senator Ayala, a Chino native, and benediction will be given by Monignor Michael Cooney, a personal friend of the Senator.

Exemplifying the use of the park, local runners will head out at 7:30 am for a 3K or 5K run that begins and ends at the facility, and at 8:30 am play continues in the three day adult softball tournament at the new park. The tournament will break during the dedication ceremonies.

Following the ceremonies, a senior softball exhibition and a Pop Warner football exhibition will be held, and throughout the afternoon, AYSO soccer games will be going on.

The concession stand at the park will open all day from 7:30 am.
